

Meetings of the I. S. C. Chapter of the Jr. A. V. M. A.

October 3, 1940

The meeting was called to order by President Beardmore. After stating that the meeting had been primarily called to acquaint the first year men with the members of the staff, Mr. Beardmore introduced Dean Murray. Dean Murray told the group about the selection of the class of '44, and also stated some interesting facts about the students now in the division. He then introduced the members of the research division; the department heads, who introduced their staff; and persons associated with the division in various other capacities.

October 16, 1940

November 6, 1940

The group was very fortunate in having Harry D. Linn, I.S.C. '24, with them to demonstrate methods of restraining horses. Mr. Linn has had a great deal of experience in this work and has given several previous demonstrations on the campus.

A few items of new business were discussed and a special meeting for November 12, was announced for the purpose of showing some film of interest to veterinary students.
