Students Attend Annual N.C.S.C. A.V.M.A. Educational Symposium

Nineteen sophomores and eight juniors from the ISU College of Veterinary Medicine attended the Second Annual National Council of Student Chapters of the A.V.-M.A. Educational Symposium held this year at Auburn University, Auburn, Alabama. This two day symposium took place on February 11th and 12th.

This year's program included tours of the new Auburn University Veterinary College and Clinic, and tours of Tuskegee Veterinary School and Veterinary Research Facilities. Topics discussed at the morning and afternoon seminar sessions included central hospitals, the antivivisectionist movement, client communications, the role of minority groups in veterinary medicine, and diversified investments for the professional man. Bill Liska and Craig Schwartz, Iowa State's delegates to the convention, attended the delegates' workshop over which Bill presided as N.C.S.C. president.

Not all was seriousness, however, as banquets held on both nights followed by social hours at the Alpha Psi and Omega Tau Sigma fraternity houses offered everyone a time to relax and get to know stu-

dents from the seventeen veterinary colleges in the United States and Canada which participated in this educational symposium.

Future Plans

With the end of the year so rapidly approaching, most students are looking forward to summer vacation, a three-month break from books and a pause to earn the money which will allow them to return in the fall; not so for the seniors. They are counting the days until they leave the ISU College of Veterinary Medicine to take their places in the ranks of licensed, graduate veterinarians everywhere.

A poll of the Class of '72 was recently taken to survey the plans of this year's seniors after graduation. Of the forty-one seniors responding to the poll, twelve (29%) plan to enter large animal practices, nine (22%) are planning on small animal work, five (12%) are going into mixed practices, seven (17%) have been accepted for various internships, and seven (17%) had not, at the time of this poll, made any definite plans.

The geographical distribution of this year's senior class which will take place after graduation includes thirteen states and Canada. Twelve graduates (29% of those responding to this poll) plan to remain in various practices in Iowa. Three seniors will be heading for Minnesota, while there will be two seniors going to each of the following states: Missouri, Illinois, Washington, California, and New York. Connecticut, Washington, South Dakota, Massachusetts, Colorado, and Nebraska will each claim one '72 graduate.

Both of the seniors going to Canada after graduation will be going into internships at Saskatoon, Saskatchewan—one to a large animal internship, and one to a small animal internship.

Other internships which have been accepted by members of this senior class include: an ambulatory internship at Cornell University in Ithaca, New York, a small animal surgery internship at Colorado State University at Fort Collins, a large animal internship and a pathology internship both at the University of California at Davis, and a small animal internship at Angell Memorial in Boston, Mass.

Take Drug Trip
