

countered by veterinarians in the field, especially in larger cities. This included parakeets, parrots, cockatoos, cockatils, canaries, rice birds, the Java Temple Bird, and the Mynah. General bird management was then touched upon which was followed by a description of the proper method to handle cage birds and how to conduct a thorough physical exam of both the bird itself and its environment. The remaining time was then devoted to those specific problems and disease conditions of cage birds which seem to make up the bulk of avian disorders seen by the practitioner.

This seminar and the many others which have been given by faculty members and guests, I believe, serve as a valuable supplement to the basic academic curriculum the students receive. Most of the seminars have been oriented to give information which will be useful to the student when he graduates and is in the field. Dr. Graham certainly, through his presentation, encouraged future graduate veterinarians who attended to try to be of professional service to the avian client and patient instead of referring him down the road.
